YES TO FORESTS UPDATE

> The Kickapoo Rail Trail, which currently connects

east Urbana to downtown St. Joseph via rail trail, is receiving updates this fall. Along the trail, signage, mile markers, and a few rest nodes will be installed. These nodes will feature benches for the weary hiker, interpretive signs, and wayfinding markers. In downtown St. Joseph, there will be an improved seating area near the post office with plenty of bike parking. Also in St. Joseph, a KRT parking lot will be installed. Parking, while not the most glamorous trail feature, is vital to offset nuisance parking along the trail and allow patrons who do not live nearby better access to the Kickapoo Rail Trail. The parking lot area will also feature additional bicycle parking and a fix-it repair station. Thank you to our generous donors, the Forest Preserve Friends Foundation, the Village of St. Joseph, and the Illinois Department of Transportation for their support of this project.

Exploring a New Path

Dear Friends of the Forest Preserves,



This has been a year full of transitions for many of us. I write to you today to announce that I am embarking on a big transition myself very soon – I will retire from the Forest Preserve District effective this September.

What an amazing journey it has been! This was a very difficult decision. I'm not sure which will be harder to leave - this important work or the dedicated staff. Cheryl Kennedy hired me to a part-time position at the Early American Museum (now Museum of the Grand Prairie) fourteen years ago after I stepped away from a long career in city government. I was in search of a new challenge, and the mission of the Forest Preserve District had always resonated with me. She offered me a position and I jumped at the opportunity.

As I look back over the years, what I brought to the District pales in comparison to all that I gained. What other job allows you to learn all about Lincoln's time in central Illinois, the natural resource benefits of native plants, how to churn butter and tap maple trees, how a wetland works, the ways that fire benefits the prairie ecosystem, and that turtles like to have their backs scratched? I got to drive down hiking trails in a Prius with Jerry Pagac, walk the Kickapoo Rail Trail when it was more rail than trail, manage a referendum campaign in the midst of a global pandemic, and constantly be the last person to spot a bald eagle flying overhead. I also met so many wonderful people who treasure and support these forest preserves.

I will continue to serve as a board member on the Forest Preserve Friends Foundation, so this isn't good-bye. I hope to visit with many of you in my new role. But I do want to say a heartfelt thank you for your trust and for your friendship over these last many years.

2021 Tourism Impact Award
