the route. Hence, the group self-described as Ramp Runners.

Through those years over 70 people including seven women have participated in those workouts. Perhaps, the allure of the group is the eclectic mix of personalities and professions. For example, there are individuals from academia, accounting, agriculture, banking, education administration, financial services, law, medicine, non-profits, sales, and science. Spirited arguments about politics and life in general helped shift the focus from the pain of running and encouraged attendance to correct the erroneous views of other group members. However, the 5 a.m. starting time has been problematic for the recruit of new members. Nevertheless, in addition to the exercise regimen, there have been social gatherings, which continue to this day.



Members of the group have been financial contributors to the Champaign County Forest Preserve and the Rail Trail project, and some have contributed their talents through various organizations for years to help create the reality. And, the Ramp Runners use this beautiful trail to run, bike and walk. Certainly there is nothing better than watching the sunrise or enjoying the landscape at any time while enjoying this wonderful venue.

YOUR STORY

Just a short distance east of Fulls Siding on the Rail Trail there is a very good quality bench with a plaque inscribed "In memory of The Ramp Runners." One might wonder, who are these characters?

Well, decades ago there was an early morning men's fitness class at the old McKinley YMCA on Church Street in Champaign. For a time, the group did calisthenics and ran laps in the gym. As the running craze was growing, the group moved outside. Since 10K (6 mile) running events were popular, the group mapped

out six-mile routes for Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and ran those routes year-round regardless of the weather conditions. Eventually members would travel to run events in other cities that had more varied topography than Champaign-Urbana. To train for those hills the group included parking ramps along

On Your Nov 3 Ballot

The referendum asks voters to approve a limiting rate increase of .016% (**1.6¢**) on the Forest Preserve's property tax levy. The limiting rate would go from .0873% to .1033%.

We Need Your Help

The funds would be used for **upkeep, repairs and restoration** of the Forest Preserve's aging buildings, roads, bridges, dams, ponds and facilities.

The Forest Preserve's property tax rate has remained substantially **unchanged in 40 years**, attesting to our outstanding stewardship of taxpayers' money.

But 1980 revenue doesn't cover 2020 costs.

- Restore** Middle Fork's Willow Pond
- Improve** the Homer Lake Interpretive Center
- Replace** the roof on the covered bridge at Lake of the Woods; **repair** the dam & spillway at Lake of the Woods and Homer Lake
- Improve** bike paths and trails
- Upgrade** public restrooms
- Create** more nature and history connections through children's programming



THE REFERENDUM FAILS. The Forest Preserves will be forced to:

- Forego** much needed repairs across all sites
- Close** unsafe and deteriorating facilities and structures
- Cut** some programs and events, and raise fees on others
- Delay** restroom, trail, and playground updates indefinitely
- Shrink** the budget for equipment, staffing, and technology needs


